Welcome to Leadership Conference III

The Washington Group welcomes you to Leadership Conference III — Changes in Ukraine: Assessment and Response.

A mass movement for change in Ukraine, calling for more political, economic and cultural independence, recently held its founding congress in Kiev. As the Communist Party leadership in Moscow and Kiev looked on, many participants, including Party members, demanded the ouster of the Brezhnev holdover, Ukrainian Communist Party leader Volodymyr Shcherbytsky. Some called for the outright independence of Ukraine. One week later in Lviv, the central city in western Ukraine, an estimated 150,000 people took to the streets, carrying hundreds of blue-and-yellow flags of the once-independent Ukraine and demanded the legalization of the Ukrainian Catholic Church.

These unprecedented events, which made front-page headlines around the world last month, were but the latest and most obvious manifestations of changes brewing in the Soviet Union's second largest republic. Few will deny that Gorbachev's policies of *glasnost* and *perestroika* have brought noticeable change to the Soviet Union and, along with it, to Ukraine, if only in the area of the people being able to express their opinions and aspirations more freely. What does it all mean and what does it portend for the future, however, are questions on which observers differ.

The goal of this third TWG Leadership Conference is, with the help of some of the leading experts in the field, to present the facts of what is happening in Ukraine and assess them as comprehensively as is possible during a weekend gathering.

Congressman Steny H. Hoyer, Co-Chairman of the U.S. Helsinki Commission, who has studied — and influenced — changes in the Soviet Union over a number of years, will set the stage for our two-day discussion in his opening keynote address.

After the opening address, a panel will assess developments in Ukraine and the Soviet Union from three important points of view: Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Human Rights and Humanitarian Affairs Paula J. Dobriansky, will give the U.S. government's assessment; Mykola Rudenko, the founder of the Ukrainian Helsinki Group, for which he was imprisoned, will present the Ukrainian human rights movement's assessment; and Dr. Stephan Woroch, a member of the secretariat of the World Congress of Free Ukrainians, will present the views of the mainstream Ukrainian diaspora.

Ukraine's ties with the world outside the Soviet Union - in the academic, cultural, economic and scientific fields — have been undergoing dramatic changes in the last few years. The conference panel which will analyze these developments includes Prof. George G. Grabowicz, director of the Ukrainian Research Institute of Harvard University, and of the International Association of Ukrainian Studies, which he recently established with colleagues in Ukraine; Virko Baley, music director and conductor of the Las Vegas Symphony Orchestra, who has initiated and is pursuing music exchanges with Ukraine; Andrew Bihun, director of market analysis at the Department of Commerce, who in the past year has been concentrating on U.S. trade analysis with an emphasis on Ukraine; and Marta Cehelsky, director of the Issues Development Group and a senior policy analyst with the National Science Foundation.

In preparing the Leadership Conference III program, the planning committee identified four major issues confronting Ukraine at this time: political, national, religious, and ecological. To discuss them, the committee was fortunate enough to engage Paul A. Goble, Soviet nationalities affairs analyst of the Department of State, to look at the political developments in the Soviet Union; Bozhena Olshaniwsky, director of Americans for Human Rights in Ukraine, who will concentrate on efforts to revive the Ukrainian language and culture; Prof. Bohdan R. Bociurkiw of Carleton University in Ottawa, a leading specialist in Soviet religious. policy, especially in Ukraine; and David Marples, research associate at the Canadian Institute of Ukrainian Studies at the University of Alberta and author of two books on the Chornobyl nuclear disaster, the site of which he recently visited.

We believe the program is exciting and interesting. We are certain that the presentations of the invited speakers and the discussions that follow, will provide you, the participants, with enough facts and viewpoints to help you formulate your own assessment and response to the recent changes in Ukraine.

The Washington Group

The Washington Group, an Association of Ukrainian-American Professionals (TWG), was founded in 1984 with the intention of providing an organizational forum for Americans of Ukrainian descent to participate in activities that preserve and promote their heritage, advance their professional growth and maintain social contact with others of common interest.

The Group began with 54 members — mostly young professionals living in the Washington metropolitan area. Today with membership approaching 350, TWG includes professionals, as well as students and retirees, who live throughout the United States, with several in Canada and in Europe.

Taking advantage of its unique location — the U.S. capital — TWG has worked to inform the public and the government about issues of concern to Ukrainian Americans through its varied activities and publications: Friday Evening Forums, Leadership Conferences, Distinguished Speaker series, the *TWG News* newsletter, articles and letters to the media, and cultural events. The TWG Fellowship Fund, co-sponsorship of the annual Antononych Foundation Literary Awards and the publication of a membership directory round out the organization's normal activities.

The past year's activities centered on the unprecendented events in Ukraine: two evenings about the state of the Ukrainian churches — one with Rev. Vasyl Romaniuk, a human rights activist who recently emigrated to the West; another with theologian Rev. Andrij Chirovsky. Three Ukrainian Americans, who participated in the International Peace Walk from Odessa to Kiev — Darian Diachok, Adrian Kerod and Bozhena Olshaniwsky talked about their experiences, as did three members of the Helsinki Commission staff who traveled to Moscow — Orest Deychakiwsky, John Finnerty and Ron McNamara. Historians Zenon Kohut and Orest Subtelny, talked about their recently published books on Ukrainian history.

TWG's first direct contact with *glasnost* came in January with Vitali Korotych, the Ukrainian editor of the popular Soviet magazine *Ogonyok*. He was followed by four literary figures from Kiev — critic Ivan Dziuba, historian Mykola Zhulynsky, novelist Raisa Ivanchenko and poet Ihor Rymaruk. Another group came in July: stage director Les Taniuk, drama historian Nelli Kornienko and poet Pavlo Movchan. The summer came to a close with a visit of a business delegation from Kiev — Serhiy Berezevenko, Serhiy Mischenko and Vitaly Voloshin.

In 1989, The Washington Group also sponsored recitals by two world-renowned musicians from Ukraine — violinist Oleh Krysa and pianist Aleksander Slobodyanik.

There were social events as well, including a reception for more than 400 after the Ukrainian Millennium concert at DAR Constitution Hall, the traditional Christmas party, TWG *Tabir* on the Eastern Shore of Maryland and a pool party.

A few days following this Leadership Conference, a TWG group of about 30 will go on a two-week trip to Ukraine, where, in addition to seeing the sights, they will meet with their professional counterparts.

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
Leadership Conference 1987

Over 200 Ukrainian American and Canadian professionals and community leaders attended the second Leadership Conference, held in Washington to discuss the issue of how Ukrainians are perceived and to suggest strategies for promoting and publicizing their concerns.

The very successful conference began with a get-together marking TWG's third birthday. The following day's activities began with a morning session discussing perception of Ukrainians both by themselves and by others. Martha Bohachevsky-Chomiak, of the National Endowment for the Humanities and George Washington University, spoke about the perception problem from a historical perspective; Victor Malarek, senior writer for the Toronto Globe and Mail, followed with an analysis of these perceptions in the media; and three lawyers, William Wolf, Patience Huntwork, and Orest Jejna, members of the Independent Task Force on ABA-Soviet Relations described how this problem affects their work.

The luncheon speaker, Assistant Secretary of State for Human Rights and Humanitarian Affairs Richard Schifter described the realities of *glasnost* - policies that are falling short of freedom of expression and democratization in the Western sense. *Glasnost* is a useful tool when it serves the purpose of the current Soviet leadership, mainly to expose inefficiency, ineptitude and corruption in the Soviet bureaucracy, according to Schifter.

In the afternoon, the first sessions were devoted to discussions on Ukrainians in politics, business and government, and were chaired by Andrew Fedynsky, Olha Holoyda, and Katya Chumachenko. The second sessions were discussions on enhancing the Ukrainian image through information, the media, and the legal system. Olha Rybakoff, Myron Wasylyk and Jurij Dobczansky chaired these panels.



TWG Fellowship Awards

The nation's capital provides a wealth of resources, human, archival, institutional, which have been underutilized by Ukrainians in the past. Recently historians, scholars, and others have shown an interest in uncovering the unknown or forgotten pieces of Ukrainian history, here in the U. S. and in Ukraine. The Washington Group Fellowship Program is designed to encourage this kind of research by using Washington's many resources.

The 1987 Fellowship Awards were presented to TWG member Adrian Karmazyn and Petro Melnycky. Karmazyn, now an international broadcaster at the Ukrainian branch of the Voice of America, did a bibliographic review of parts of the 26-volume work on Ukrainian cities and towns, Istoria Mist i Sil' Ukrainy (History of the Cities and Villages of Ukraine). Under the guidance of Paul Goble, the Special Assistant for Soviet Nationality Affairs at the State Department, Karmazyn chose four subjects for his study: a tally of Communist Party members in Lviv and Dnipropetrovsk oblasts; a tally of physicians in those oblasts; Ukrainian casualties in World War II, and historic churches in existence in the Lviv oblast at the time of publication. In addition, Karmazyn translated from Ukrainian into English the 20 page history of the city of Chornobyl found in the Istoria.

Istoria was a significant component of what Karmazyn called "Shelest's campaign for *glasnost*," 20 years before Gorbachev. Some 100,000 scholars, artists, historians, writers, educators and eyewitnesses, directed by Communist Party officials, were engaged in researching, writing, and producing the history of 34,000 "population points" of Ukraine.

Melnycky, a resident of Edmonton, Alberta, did his research on internment of Ukrainians by the United States and Canada during World War I. While internment in the US was limited, the situation was much more grave in Canada. About 6,000 out of the 8,579 internees were Ukrainians. Canadian authorities feared that the Ukrainians from Austria-Hungary may commit subversive acts or otherwise interfere with the war operation.

Melnycky spent most of his time in Washington researching the National Archives and the Library of Congress. Melnycky found several thousand State Department documents on the question of civilian prisoners

and enemy combatants in North America and Europe during World War I at the National Archives. He also examined Justice and War Department records regarding the establishment and operation of internment camps in the United States. These materials will eventually be published in a book, *In the Shadow of the Rockies*. Melnycky has already written numerous articles on this topic, and hopes to continue researching, as volumes of documents still wait to be examined.

Marta Kolomayets, Ihor Fedorowycz, and TWG member Markian Bilynsky are the winners of the 1988 TWG Fellowships. Kolomayets, of New York City, is associate editor of *The Ukrainian Weekly*. She will write a monograph on the personal experiences of the Kolomayets family during the 1930s famine in Ukraine, using the resources of the US Commission on the Ukraine Famine and the Library of Congress.

Ihor Fedorowycz, a Rhodes Scholar from 1980-1983, of Ann Arbor, Michigan, will work on British, French and American Foreign Policies and Ukrainian National Self-Determination in East Galicia, 1918-1923. This will serve as his dissertation at Oxford University's Queens College. He will do research at the State Department, National Archives and the Library of Congress.

Bilynsky, a graduate student at American University, will use his award money to complete his master's thesis on the topic *A Systems Analysis of the Relationship between the Ukrainian Catholic Church and the Soviet Political Authorities Under Glasnost.* Bilynsky is a graduate of the University of Manchester and a native of England.

TWG Board of Directors, and interested participants met at a lodge in Maryland's Catoctin Mountains, near the Presidential retreat at Camp David, to crystallize their vision of what The Washington Group's long-term goals and objectives should be. They emerged with the guiding vision that TWG should be "leading Ukrainians to excellence and influence".

TWG member Vasyl Kornylo, a management efficiency expert at Xerox Corp. Rochester, N.Y., conducted the weekend strategy session. The group discussed goals, management techniques, assessed TWG's past, and focused on where it should be ten, twenty, fifty years from now. Among TWG's strengths, the participants listed a strong, dedicated core group that is young, vital, committed and experienced, and harbors no "political hang-ups." Its programs are of high quality, diverse and of interest not only to members, but to the general Ukrainian community.

On the negative side, TWG lacks financial, fundraising and investing strategies. Board members are overburdened, do not delegate tasks sufficiently and in many cases, do not cultivate future leaders.

Some areas of development in the future include a job/ internship bank, and more contacts with Americans who may have an interest in Ukrainian affairs.




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


Notes On Participants

VIRKO BALEY is music director and conductor of the Las Vegas Symphony Orchestra and artist in residence at the University of Nevada in Las Vegas. He has been in that capacity for ten years. He has conducted in the USSR, Ukraine, Mexico and Canada. In addition to being a conductor, he is a published composer, and author, and an accomplished pianist. He is president of Video Ukraine, Inc., USA, collaborating film, video and TV productions with film director Yuriy Illyenko and the Dovzhenko Film Studio in Kiev. Their purpose is to present Ukrainian films and videos to the U.S. audience. He has a B. M. and M. M. degrees from the Los Angeles Conservatory of Music and Art (California Institute of the Arts).


ANDREW BIHUN is director of the Market Analysis Division, U.S./Foreign Commercial Service, Department of Commerce. He is responsible for all Commerce programs that analyze foreign marketing opportunities for U.S. exporters. In the past year, his activities included involvement in U.S. trade analysis, with special emphasis on Ukraine. He is a graduate of Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service. A member of TWG, he is also deputy director of the PLAST youth organization.

BOHDAN R. BOCIURKIW is a professor of Political Science at Carleton University in Ottawa. He was born in Ukraine and received his B.A. and M.A. from the University of Manitoba in Winnipeg and a Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of Chicago. He began his academic career teaching at the University of Alberta in Edmonton (1956-1969) and has since taught at Carleton University, where he was the founding director of the Institute of Soviet and East European Studies. He has also served as visiting professor at Harvard Summer School and McGill University and lectured at a number of other universities and research institutes in Canada, the U.S., Great Britain, Germany, France, Italy, Poland, Australia, Israel and China. In 1984-85 he was a senior fellow at the Kennan Institute



for Advanced Russian Studies in Washington, D. C. He is a fellow of the Shevchenko Scientific Society, past president of the Canadian Association of Slavists. Prof. Bociurkiw is a specialist in Soviet politics, with a long-standing research interest in Soviet policies with respect to religion -especially in Ukraine. His interests also include nationallies, human rights and dissent as well as political succession problems in the USSR. He has published several monographs and over sixty papers in academic journals and symposia, edited and coauthored a book Religion and Atheism in the USSR and Eastern Europe (London: Macmillan, 1975), coauthored and edited a section on Ukrainian churches in Ukraine: A Concise Encyclopedia, Vol. 2 (Toronto University Press, 1971), and in Encyclopedia of Ukrainian Studies (Toronto University Press), Vol. 1 (1984) and Vol. 2 (1987).

MARTA CEHELSKY is Director of the Issues Development Group and senior policy analyst at the National Science Foundation. Since 1988 she has also been responsible for management of speech preparation, issues identification and policy analysis for the NSF Director Erich Bloch. Earlier, Dr. Cehelsky was legislative analyst at the NSF, coordinating legislative policy, serving as liaison to Congress in areas of science and engineering education, export controls, space, technology transfer and immigration. She was policy analyst at the NSF from 1980 to 1984.



Before joining the NSF, she was special assistant to Senator Ernest F. Hollings, policy analyst at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and assistant professor at the City University of New York. She received a B. A. degree from Barnard College, and a M. A. and Ph.D. from Columbia University. She has authored *Land Reform in Brazil. The Management of Social Change* (Boulder, Colorado, 1979) and *Guatemala Election Factbook, 1966* (Washington, 1966).

MARTHA BOHACHEVSKY-CHOMIAK is currently a program administrator at the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH). Previously she had been a full professor of Russian intellectual history, and has also taught and written on East European history, Ukrainian history and the history of women. She is the author of three books and coauthor of one. Her latest work, Feminists Despite Themselves (Edmonton: Canadian Institute of Ukrainian Studies, 1988) focuses on the role of women in Ukrainian community life between 1884 and 1939. The book constitutes a history of the Ukrainian women's movement and is based on her original research in the archives of Ukraine, Russia, Poland, Czechoslovakia and Austria, as well as on interviews with persons living in North America and on documents in their personal archives. Dr. Bohachevsky-Chomiak received a B.A. from the University of Pennsyl

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

OREST DEYCHAKIWSKY is a staff member, Commission on Security and Cooperation in Europe (Helsinki Commission). He serves as the country officer for Bulgaria and Ukraine and is responsible for the Commission's human rights contacts casework and intern program, as well as for contacts with non-governmental organizations. He has been a member of U.S. delegations to various meetings of the 35-nation Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe, most recently the Paris Conference on the Human Dimension. Mr. Deychakiwsky graduated from the University of Notre Dame and holds an M. A. degree from Georgetown University. He is a founding member of TWG and has served on its board of directors and auditing committee. He currently serves as TWG secretary.

PAULA DOBRIANSKY is Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Bilateral and Multilateral Human Rights Affairs. Previously, she served as Director of European and Soviet Affairs at the National Security Council, at the White House, with primary responsibility for the development and implementation of U.S. policy toward all East European countries. Before joining the NSC, she was staff assistant for NATO affairs in the Bureau of Intelligence and Research at the State Department, research assistant on the Joint Economic Committee staff of the U.S. Congress, and staff assistant with the Immigration and Naturalization Service in Rome. Ms. Dobriansky received a B.S.F.S. degree from the Georgetown University School of Foreign Service *summa cum laude* and an M. A. from Harvard University. She is the recipient of Phi Beta Kappa and has been a Fulbright-Hays Scholar.

GEORGE G. GRABOWICZ is the director of the Ukrainian Research Institute and Dmytro Cyzevskyj Professor of Ukrainian Literature at Harvard University. He is also chairman of the American Committee of Slavicists and vice president (for North America) of the recently formed International Association of Ukrainian Studies. Prof. Grabowicz received a B.A. degree from Yale University and an M.A. and Ph.D. from Harvard University. He has authored two books - Toward the History of Ukrainian Literature (1981) and The Poet as Mythmaker (1982), a Ukrainian translation of which is scheduled to appear in Kiev in 1990 -and a translation, with introduction, of Roman Ingarden's The Literary Work of Art (1973). He has written numerous articles on Ukrainian, Polish and Russian literature and literary theory. Currently he is working on essays on Shevchenko (aspects of autobiography and psychology) and the reception of Mickiewicz and Shevchenko.

GOBLE is a Soviet nationalities affairs analyst with the Bureau of Intelligence and Research at the State Department. In that capacity, he follows and reports on developments in the non-Russian areas of the USSR. Before coming to the State Department, he was a Soviet affairs analyst at the Foreign Broadcast Information Service. He has authored numerous publications. He received a B.A. degree summa cum laude at Miami University of Ohio, and an M. A. from the University of Chicago.

STENY HOYER, U.S. Representative from the 5th District of Maryland, is co-chairman of the Commission on Security and Cooperation in Europe (Helsinki Commission). He also serves as member of the House Appropriations Committee and three of its subcommittees. In the Democratic Party, he was elected by his colleagues to serve as the chair of the House Democratic Caucus, one of five elected positions in the House Democratic leadership. Rep. BOZHENA OLSHANIWSKY is president of Americans for Human Rights in Ukraine (AHRU). AHRU's primary goal is to bring to the attention of the U. S. government human rights abuses in Ukraine. 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

AHRU also provides technical and financial assistance to various human rights groups in Ukraine. Opening up a U.S. Consulate in Kiev is the top priority for AHRU at this time. In 1988 Olshaniwsky, along with 250 Americans, and 250 Soviets participated in a Peace Walk from Odessa to Kiev. Olshaniwsky holds a B. S. degree from Seton Hall University.

MARTA PEREYMA is a cultural exchange specialist in the Bureau of Cultural and Educational Affairs of the U.S. Information Agency. She is responsible for USIA's exchange programs with the People's Republic of China and with Mongolia. In November 1976, he helped found the Ukrainian Helsinki Group and became its first chairman. He was arrested three months later, tried and sentenced to seven years of severe-regime labor camp and five years of internal exile. He was released in December 1987, one year before completing his term of exile, and forced to emigrate to the West; he lives in Jersey City, New Jersey. He is the author of numerous books of poetry, essays and novels published in Ukraine and in the United States. His latest book, Shliakh do khaosu: z prybodu ekonomichnykh reform Gorbachova (The Way to Chaos: In connection with Gorbachev's economic Reforms), was published in 1988 by Ukrainian News Publishers in Detroit.

STEPHAN WOROCH is a member of the Secretariat of the World Congress of Free Ukrainians, a position he has held since 1973. He is a member of the Executive Board of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of American and chairman of UCCA's Ukrainian Church Affairs Subcomittee, chairman of the Conference of Ukrainian-American Professional Organizations, vice president of the National Office of the Ukrainian Medical Association of North America, chairman of the Millennium of Rus-Ukraine Christianity Committee (Harvard Project) and president of the New York chapter of the Ukrainian Medical Association. Dr. Woroch is a dentist; he received his D.D.S. from New York University. Born in Ukraine, he resides in Maplewood, New Jersey.



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
