# Ukraine at Five: A Progress Report

## Conference To Analyze Accomplishments Since Ukraine's Independence

Five years after helping bring down the Soviet Union and declaring its independence, Ukraine has achieved much in many areas, but, at the same time, has lagged in others.

TWG's 1996 Leadership Conference on Columbus Day weekend, with "Ukraine at Five: A Progress Report" as its theme, will analyze that balance sheet with the help of numerous American and Ukrainian experts.

The conference, which is being cosponsored this year with the Embassy of Ukraine, the US-Ukraine Foundation and the Ukrainian Medical Association of North America, will be held October 11-13 at the Key Bridge Mariott Hotel in Arlington, Virginia, just across the Potomac River from Georgetown, in Rosslyn.

The program will feature a keynote address and two other prominent speakers; four panel discussions on Ukraine's progress; an awards banquet and dance; a reception at the Ukrainian Embassy; and a cultural program.

The most recent list of speakers includes Yuri Kostenko, Minister of Environmental Protection of Ukraine;

Strobe Talbott, Deputy Secretary of State (invited); Valeriy Kuchinsky, Minister Counselor, Ukrainian Embassy; Roman Popadiuk, first US ambassador to Ukraine; Sherman Garnett, Senior Associate, Carnegie Endowment for Peace; Ilya Prizel, Professor, Johns Hopkins University; Andrew Bihun, US Commercial Attaché in Kyiv; Steve Nix, Kyiv Office of the International Foundation for Electoral Systems; and Orest Deychakiwsky, Helsinki Commission staff.

In addition, since the conference falls on the presidential election year, the election committees of the Democratic and Republican presidential contenders were invited to send representatives to present their positions on issues of importance to the Ukrainian-American community.

As in previous conferences, this year's begins with a social get-to-gether—a reception Friday evening at

## Theodore B. Zalucky

The Washington Group lost a long-time member and generous Fellowship Fund benefactor July 30, when Dr. Theodore B. Zalucky died in Norwalk, Connecticut. He was 86.

Before moving to Norwalk, Professor Zalucky taught at The Catholic University in Washington and was the author of numerous articles in American scientific journals. He was a member of the Shevchenko Scientific Society and former president of the Society's Washington branch.

Professor Zalucky was the single-most generous contributor to the TWG Fellowship Fund, having contributed over \$3,000 since 1991.

His generous support was instrumental in enabling the TWG Fellowship Fund to continue its work in awarding grants for projects that contributed to the advancement of Ukrainians by utilizing Washington-area resources.

Professor Zalucky is survived by his wife, Myroslava, and two sons, Ihor and Myron.

Ms. Zyblikewycz's assignment is with the press office of the Embassy. She gathers Ukraine-related information by computer from the Internet, translates news releases and helps put together the Embassy's newsletter and a brochure on Ukraine.

A third-year student at Georgetown's School of Foreign Service majoring in international economics, Ms. Zyblikewycz began her internship in mid-July, following an early-summer Penn State University-sponsored fellowship

at the University of Kyiv-Mohyla Academy in Ukraine. And at the conclusion of her Embassy internship, she leaves for England, where she will spend her junior year abroad at the London School of Economics.

Ms. Zyblikewycz under-

went a "baptism of fire" of sorts at the Embassy, coming as she did just before the Washington visit of Ukraine's new prime minister Pavlo Lazarenko, which kept her and the rest of the Embassy staff busy almost around the clock.

"It was my first experience traveling with any kind of foreign dignitaries, my first press experience," the 20-yearold intern said.

"The preparation was a lot of work, but it was rewarding," she added. "I've learned so much about Ukraine in the past two weeks—everything that's going on in Ukraine, its economic reforms—and I've read the whole Constitution backwards and forwards."

Ms. Zyblikewycz grew up in Marlton, New Jersey, near Philadelphia, where she has been active in *Plast*, the Ukrainian scouting organization, and graduated from the Philadelphia's *Ridna Shkola* (Saturday Ukrainian school).

Her future plans include graduate school in economics and a career with one of the international financial organization she visited during the Prime Minister Lazarenko's talks in Washington.

Now that the western economic model is being accepted

in Ukraine and elsewhere in Eastern Europe, Ms. Zyblikew-ycz says she sees a need to re-evaluate that model and reform its shortfalls.

Ms. Zyblikewycz read about the new TWG Embassy internship program in the Ukrainian Weekly. Studying at Georgetown University, just a few blocks from the Ukrainian Embassy, she was intrigued with the possibility of working there, but at first she was not sure whether the internship would fit between her fellowship at the Kyiv Mohyla Academy and the year abroad in London.

The fellowship at the Kyiv-Mohyla Academy was Ms.

Zyblikewycz's first visit to Ukraine, which, she said, was "fantastic, out of this world." The foreign students were not isolated but lived "with the people" in the suburbs and commuted by public transit. "It wasn't

a glamorous experience at all, but it was wonderful," she

TWG President George Masiuk said the embassy internship program was established to institutionalize a link between the Ukrainian-American community and the Embassy of Ukraine.

"Besides providing the Ukrainian Embassy with insights into American society and politics, the intern will help by translating, writing press releases, and helping with computer-related work," Mr. Masiuk said.

"In return, the intern will get valuable job experience and develop contacts that hopefully will launch a successful career, perhaps one that involves Ukrainian-American relations," he added.

Even after only two weeks at the Embassy, Ms. Zyblikewycz appreciates the benefit of this new TWG program:

"It's been a great experience—exciting for now, and it will be useful in the future. Hopefully, I'm helping them out to the degree that they would like," she said.

Mr. Masiuk sees the program as a good example for other organizations to follow.

"I think this type of cooperation will serve as a model for other Ukrainian-American organizations and, hopefully, they too will sponsor interns," Mr. Masiuk said.

Since 1990, the TWG Fellowship Fund has awarded more than a dozen fellowships totaling \$14,500 to scholars, writers, journalists, and researchers utilizing reasources available in the Washington area.

#### **VOA Program Evaluators**

The Voice of America is seeking independent, language-qualified experts to help with the periodic review of VOA's 50 language services, including Ukrainian.

Participants will be asked to evaluate the linguistic quality of the broadcast language, comment on the relevance of program content to the respective audience area, and determine whether the broadcasts conform to standards of accuracy, balance, and completeness.

Those selected to participate will be sent five to 10 hours of programming on cassette, once or twice a year. Participants will be compensated.

While experts need not be native speakers, their command of a given language must be such that they can reliably evaluate the linguistic attributes noted above. Recent 'in-country' experience is required. Those interested in applying should possess at least an M.A. degree—or equivalent work experience—in area studies or linguistics directly related to the broadcast language to be evaluated. Applicants with a background in journalism are strongly encouraged to apply.

the Embassy of Ukraine, a conference co-sponsor.
